# DAY ONE

## GRATITUDE

Gratitude isn't just a spiritual reset, it's an invitation to remember. God is so good to us that we can't help but take time to express gratitude. Sometimes life gets so busy, or we get so tired, that we forget to stop and thank Him. We forget that not only does God do good things, but He is good. His goodness isn't situational; it's foundational.

Gratitude is to recall His benefits, like Psalm 103 reminds us: He forgives, heals, redeems, and satisfies. Every one of those is a reason to say, "Thank You." Whether your life feels like it's been hard, great, or somewhere in between, God has still been good. And He's done more in and through you than you might even realize. Gratitude opens your eyes to see just how faithful He's been all along.

Gratitude doesn't ignore pain or pretend everything's perfect. It acknowledges that even in what feels broken, God is still present. He's been faithful before, and He'll be faithful again.


So as you set this time apart, start here with thanksgiving. Take inventory of God's goodness. Remember the prayers He's already answered. Thank Him for His peace, His presence, and His patience. Gratitude will transform how you see your past and position your heart for what He wants to do next.

### Reflection:

What are three things you can thank God for today? These might be things you might've overlooked lately. Take a few moments to write them down and thank Him out loud.

### Prayer:

Father, thank You for Your goodness. Thank You for who You are and all You've done. Help me enter these next 21 days with a heart full of gratitude because I want to. Teach me to see Your hand in every moment, whether it's good or bad, and to live with constant praise on my lips. In Jesus' name, amen!



# DAY TWO

## REPENTANCE

Repentance is actually really simple. It's us deciding to turn from our sin and turn to God and His ways. But let's be real, the process isn't always that easy. Sometimes the guilt of our past gets in the way. We mess up, feel bad about it, and start trying to fix ourselves. We think, "If I just do better, then I'll be right with God". But that's not repentance, that's self-redemption. And only Jesus can make us right.

True repentance doesn't come from shame. It comes from revelation. It's when we realize just how good, patient, and kind our God is that we want to turn toward Him. Romans 2:4 says it's His kindness that leads us to repentance. God doesn't ask us to run away from sin because we're afraid. He calls us to run to Him because He's faithful. Repentance isn't about punishment. It's about restoration. He promises us that if we humble ourselves, pray, and seek His face, He'll hear us, forgive us, and heal what's been broken. That means there's hope for every heart and grace for every failure.


Even the people who look the most "put together" still need to turn to Jesus daily. None of us graduates from repentance. It's part of our rhythm of staying close to Him. So today, be H.O.T. (humble, open, and transparent) before God. Let conviction draw you, not drive you. Don't just turn away from what's wrong; turn toward the One who makes you right.

### Reflection:

Where in your life is God inviting you to turn closer to Him today? What would it look like to respond out of love instead of shame?

### Prayer:

God, thank You that repentance isn't fixing myself or rejection. It's restoration. Help me to see Your kindness clearly so I can turn toward You fully. I humble myself before You today. Search my heart, remove what's not like You, and lead me back into Your presence. In Jesus' name, amen!



# DAY THREE

## HEALING

GoD wants us to walk in healing because He is the Healer, and He already paid the cost. We don't have to wonder if He wants to heal us. It's already been done through Jesus. On the cross, He paid for every kind of healing: physical, emotional, mental, and spiritual. The same Jesus who made blind eyes see and lame legs walk is the same One who heals our hearts and restores our peace today.

We are reminded in Psalm 147:3 that not only does He heal the brokenhearted but He also bandages our wounds. Sometimes, that healing happens in a moment. Other times, it happens in layers. But either way, He's faithful to finish what He starts.


Maybe you've been walking through a season where it feels like you're still waiting for healing. You're praying, believing, but still carrying emotional scars or physical pain. Be encouraged that God isn't ignoring you. Your sickness or pain doesn't have to define your story. Healing doesn't always look like we expect, but it always looks like Jesus. Whether He heals instantly or over time, His goal is wholeness and making you complete in Him. So don't settle for surviving when He's called you to be restored. Today, bring every sickness, every wound, every disappointment to the One who still heals. You may be damaged, but you are not destroyed.

### Reflection:

Where do you need God's healing power most today: your body, mind, or heart? How can you invite Him into that space with trust instead of frustration?

### Prayer:

God, thank You that You're still my Healer. You see every place in me that hurts, and You call it whole before I've even experienced it. I trust You with my past that may still hold pain, and I trust You with the process of healing. Help me to see that even the cracks are places You can pour through. I receive Your healing today. In Jesus' name, amen!



# DAY FOUR

## RESTORATION

Restoration doesn't just mean something is fixed. It means it's completed and whole. When God restores, He doesn't just patch the cracks or throw a Band-Aid over what's broken. He brings it back better than before. Restoration means newness, fullness, and strength to something of the past.

When something needs to be restored, it usually means it's been worn down or broken over time. It's lost its shine or its strength. Maybe that's how you've felt lately. Maybe your past has chipped away at your peace, your confidence, or even your hope. The good news? God specializes in restoration. 1 Peter 5:10 says that after you've suffered a little while, God Himself will restore, support, and strengthen you. He's not ignoring what you've been through. He's rebuilding you from the inside out.


The greatest example of restoration is the cross. Because of Jesus, what was once dead (our relationship with God) was not just repaired but completely restored. Through His sacrifice, we didn't just get back to where we were before sin. We stepped into something better: eternal access to God's love, peace, and presence. So today, bring your broken pieces to Him. He's not trying to make your old life work again. He's building something brand new.

### Reflection:

What area of your life feels worn down or broken? How can you invite God to not just fix it, but fully restore it better than before?

### Prayer:

God, thank You that You're not a quick-fix kind of God. You're a restorer. Thank You for rebuilding what's been broken in or around me and making it new. I give You every place that feels worn down and trust that You'll bring beauty from it. In Jesus' name, amen!



# DAY FIVE

## LAMENT

Lamenting may be a new word for some of us, but it's not a new feeling. It's closely connected to grief and sorrow. In church, we can sometimes be quick to run from emotions that feel negative. We want to skip the pain and jump straight to the praise. We throw a quick "But God!" over the ache in our hearts. But lament isn't the absence of faith; it's the honest expression of faith in our pain.

God can be sovereign, and you can be sorrowful. Lament gives us permission to bring the full weight of our emotions to God, trusting that He's not intimidated by our honesty. Even when your past feels heavy, you're not carrying it alone. Lament is how we process pain without letting it define us. It's how we stay close to the One who can heal what hurts. King David shows us this all through the Psalms with written laments.

The writer of Lamentations said, "I will never forget this awful time... yet I still dare to hope." That's what lament sounds like: frustration and faith in the same breath. It's saying, "God, I'm hurting," and "God, I still trust You."


Lament is not a lack of faith. It's faith that makes room for frustration. It's giving your pain space to breathe in the presence of God. When you allow your sorrow to be carried by your faith instead of covered by it, real healing can happen.

### Reflection:

Where have you tried to rush your healing instead of releasing your pain to God? What would it look like to bring Him your honest emotions today?

### Prayer:

God, thank You that You can handle my honesty. You're not afraid of my tears, my pain, or my questions. Help me to bring everything to You completely. Teach me to let my faith carry my frustration. In Jesus' name, amen!



# DAY SIX

## FORGIVENESS

Say this with me: “Forgiveness is for me. And forgiveness is for them.”

Forgiveness is for all of us. Both to receive and to extend. It’s freedom for our hearts and healing for our relationships. We’re able to forgive because we’ve first been forgiven. Before we ever asked for mercy, God had already extended it.

We deserved punishment, but He didn’t give it to us. Instead, He gave us the love of His Son. Psalm 103 reminds us that God doesn’t deal harshly with us as we deserve but removes our sins so far from us that they can’t even be found by Him. That’s what grace looks like for us, and it’s also the same grace we’re called to give away.

One practical way to walk in forgiveness daily is found in Colossians 3:13: “Make allowance for each other’s faults.” This means leaving room in your heart before an offense ever happens, understanding that people aren’t perfect, and their perspective may differ from yours. When you live with that kind of grace, you’re prepared to respond with forgiveness instead of reacting in frustration.


We live in a world that thrives on calling people out, but Jesus calls us to call people up. Forgiveness doesn’t minimize the hurt; it maximizes the healing. It’s not saying what happened was okay, but it’s choosing to release what’s been holding you in your past.

### Reflection:

Who do you need to forgive today? Is there someone you’ve released with your words but still hold in your heart?

### Prayer:

God, thank You for forgiving me completely. Help me to extend that same forgiveness to others, even when it’s hard. Teach me to make room for grace, respond with love, and walk in freedom. In Jesus’ name, amen!



# DAY SEVEN

## HOPE

Our hope isn't in a thing happening or a situation changing. It's much deeper than that. Our hope is in a person, Jesus. Hope that's rooted in circumstances will always shift with the seasons, but hope that's rooted in Christ stands firm through every storm.

When we trust Jesus and place all our hope in Him, something powerful happens: we begin to trust His promises. Our hope in Him becomes the foundation for our hope in what He said. As Romans 15:13 declares, God Himself is the source of hope. That means hope isn't something we have to manufacture. It's something we receive from Him.


As we grow in our relationship with God, our hope becomes confident hope. Confident hope isn't built on outcomes. It's built on His character. It's knowing that even when things don't go the way we planned, God is still working in ways we can't see. Romans 5 reminds us that hope doesn't lead to disappointment because it's fueled by His love. Sometimes the very thing we wanted the most, the opportunity, the relationship, the healing, ends up becoming one of our greatest teachers. Those moments anchor our hope deeper in who He is rather than in what we wanted Him to do. That's when our hope matures from "I hope this works out" to "I trust God no matter how this works out".

### Reflection:

Where have you been placing your hope: in outcomes or in Jesus Himself? How might shifting your focus back to Him bring peace and confidence today?

### Prayer:

God, thank You that my hope is not in what happens, but in who You are. You never fail and You never change. Help me to anchor my hope in You alone and trust that You're always working for my good. In Jesus' name, amen!



# DAY EIGHT

## LOVE OF GOD

We've taken time in the past, and now, as we move into week 2, our focus switches to the present on renewal and realignment. The love of God isn't dependent on what we've done or haven't done. It's not based on whether we win or lose, succeed or fail. It's not even determined by our obedience or disobedience. The love of God is given right now. It's consistent, constant, and complete. It's who He is and what He gives, not what we earn.

Romans 8 reminds us that nothing can separate us from the love of God. That means no mistake, no mess, and no moment can pull you out of His reach. His love doesn't change with your performance because it was never built on it in the first place.

His love has no conditions, no limits, no expiration date. The only thing that can keep us from fully experiencing His love is choosing not to receive it. And even then, His heart never turns away. He stands ready to take us back every second of every day.


It's one thing to know about the love of God, but it's another to experience it. As Ephesians 3 says, our roots grow deep when we allow His love to fill us continually. It's a love that sustains, strengthens, and makes us whole. Today, don't just believe that God loves you. Actually, let Him love you.

### Reflection:

Have you been trying to earn God's love instead of receiving it? What would it look like to simply rest and let Him love you today?

### Prayer:

God, thank You that Your love is unconditional and unchanging. Help me to stop striving for what You've already given freely. Let my roots grow deep in Your love and teach me to receive it daily. In Jesus' name, amen!



# DAY NINE

## IDENTITY

Our identity before Christ is completely changed once we accept Him. When we give our lives to Jesus, we don't just get a new start. We receive a new identity. He calls us His children, His chosen people, His very own possession.

But it doesn't stop there. Your name might still be the same. You might have the same job, live in the same house, and walk through some of the same challenges. But inside, something begins to shift. God transforms our identity little by little, year by year, moment by moment. He's constantly pulling us closer to Him, and the closer we get, the more we begin to see who we really are.

Our identity is sometimes unknowingly shaped by life, trauma, or even successes. Maybe people told you who they thought you were or who they thought you'd never be. But those voices don't get the final say. When you actually start believing what God says about you, everything changes. It changes how you think, how you speak, and how you show up in the world. You stop striving for validation because you realize you already have affirmation from the One who matters most.


Here's the beautiful tension: our identity in Christ is set in truth, but our understanding and expression of it are always growing. The foundation of who we are never changes, but how we live from that truth matures as we walk with God.

### Reflection:

What part of your God-given identity feels hardest to believe right now? How can you begin to live from that truth instead of what life has told you?

### Prayer:

God, thank You that who I am is secure in You. Help me to see myself through Your truth and not through my past. Teach me to live out my identity every day with confidence in who You've called me to be. In Jesus' name, amen.



# DAY TEN

## HOLY SPIRIT

God didn't just save us and leave us to figure things out in our own strength. He gave us the Holy Spirit, the ultimate upgrade for our lives. The Holy Spirit isn't a power or a presence; He's a person. He's our comforter, our counselor, our helper, and our power source. And, He is present with you right where you are, right now.

Acts 1:8 says, "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you." That power is for your everyday life. It's the power to forgive when you'd rather fight back. Power to have peace when everything feels unstable. Power to be bold in your faith when it would be easier to stay quiet.


The Holy Spirit doesn't just live with us; He lives in us. He reminds us of truth, helps us pray, and produces fruit that looks like Jesus: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Galatians 5:22–23).

But there's more. The Holy Spirit also gives us a heavenly language and a way to communicate with God beyond our own understanding. Romans 8 says that even when we don't know what to pray, the Spirit prays through us. This is the gift of tongues, and it's available to each of us. It's not weird. It's not elite. It's intimate. It's your direct connection to the heart of God.

Salvation is the start, but the Spirit is the upgrade. God doesn't want you to live a saved life with no power. He wants you to live a Spirit-filled life that transforms you and everyone around you.

### Prayer:

Holy Spirit, thank You for living in me. Be my comforter when I'm hurting, my counselor when I'm unsure, my helper when I'm weak, and my power source every day. Fill me fresh today, and help me walk in Your presence and power. In Jesus' name, amen.



# DAY ELEVEN

## SPIRITUAL DISCIPLINES

Spiritual disciplines are less about rules and more about rhythms. They're the consistent patterns that strengthen our relationship with God. These rhythms, like prayer, worship, fasting, reading Scripture, solitude, and generosity, aren't boxes to check; they're ways we stay close to His heart.

Paul told Timothy, "Train yourself to be godly" (1 Timothy 4:7). That means there's some effort involved. Not because God's love is earned but because spiritual maturity is developed. The more consistent we are in these spiritual rhythms, the more spiritually fit we become.

In Matthew 6, Jesus said, "When you pray..." not if you pray. Prayer, study, and worship were assumed rhythms of the believer's life because they keep our hearts aligned with His.

Joshua 1:8 reminds us to meditate on God's Word day and night. That's not just about reading Scripture. It's about remaining in Scripture until it begins to shape our thoughts, emotions, and responses.


The work we put in isn't required by rules to be a good Christian, but they enhance how we experience God and how others experience us. The process might not always feel exciting, but consistency is where transformation happens. Growth doesn't come overnight, but it can start now. Take an action step to start a new rhythm today.

### Reflection:

Are there spiritual rhythms—prayer, worship, fasting, Scripture, solitude, generosity—that you need to realign in this season? What step can you take today to strengthen that rhythm?

### Prayer:

God, thank You that I don't have to earn Your love and acceptance, but I can grow in it. Teach me to build rhythms that keep me close to You. Help me train my heart for godliness and stay consistent in the things that make me more like You. In Jesus' name, amen!



# DAY TWELVE

## WISDOM & INSIGHT

We love when God gives us a clear “yes” or “no,” a step-by-step plan, or an answer that feels easy to follow. And sometimes He does. But other times, God doesn’t just want to give us the answer. He wants to make us wise. Wisdom and insight are not the same thing.

Insight isn’t just information. It’s having God’s perspective. Insight allows us to see our families, decisions, conflicts, and opportunities the way heaven sees them. While wisdom helps us apply truth to our everyday lives, insight lifts our eyes above the surface so we can discern what’s really happening. You may need applied knowledge (wisdom), or you may need heaven’s viewpoint (insight). God generously offers both.

But here’s the deeper truth: wisdom often demands transformation. Many times, the barrier isn’t that we don’t know what to do. It’s that we don’t want to offer what wisdom will shift in us. A perspective change. A conversation we’ve been avoiding. Forgiveness we don’t want to extend. A lifestyle we’re hesitant to surrender. Wisdom doesn’t just give you answers; it forms you into the kind of person who can walk in them now.


God isn’t just trying to answer your questions. He’s trying to shape your sight and form your character. Because when wisdom forms in you and insight forms through you, you begin to see everything around you differently.

### Reflection:

Where do you need wisdom and where do you need insight in your current situation?

### Prayer:

Lord, thank You for offering both wisdom and insight. I trust that You see all things and know better than I do, so I don’t just want answers. Shape the way I think and open my eyes to see from heaven’s viewpoint. Help me surrender whatever You’re asking for as I trust You to lead me. In Jesus’ name, amen!



# DAY THIRTEEN

## BECOMING LIKE JESUS

Becoming like Jesus is a steady process of letting God transform our humanity into something that looks more like Him. It isn't just about believing in Him. Becoming like Jesus is a daily decision. It's a decision for today. Transformation is more than a moment of saying "yes"; it's a consistent surrender that meets us right where we are.

And here's the truth: it's not something we can do on our own. Spiritual maturity isn't built through trying harder; it's formed in our attitudes, our posture, our obedience, and our willingness to serve. Jesus didn't simply tell us what to do. He modeled it. He humbled Himself, gave up privilege, washed feet, welcomed the overlooked, and obeyed His Father all the way to the cross.

All you have is truly all you need, because the Holy Spirit does the shaping. Becoming like Jesus means surrendering our preferences, our pride, and our old patterns so He can form something new within us.



God, thank You for not only showing me how to become more like Jesus, but also empowering me to do it. I surrender my preferences, pride, and old patterns to You. You have given me all that I need. Keep me close and help me grow with humility, grace, and boldness. In Jesus' name.



# DAY FOURTEEN

## FAITH TO MOVE FORWARD

It's important for us to reflect and to be present, but it's also necessary for us to move forward. Scripture tells us that faith is the evidence of what we hope for. It's the vehicle required to make something that was just a thought into a reality. Stepping into what God has for us requires faith. Not just faith to believe and stay, but faith that actually moves.

Moving forward feels risky because it means leaving behind what's familiar, predictable, or comfortable. But God's presence always goes with us, so we can trust that forward faith isn't blind. It's anchored in who God is, even when we can't see what comes next.

Faith to move forward often starts with everyday obedience. Big miracles begin with your current place of faithfulness. You don't need perfect conditions. You don't need a fully mapped-out plan. You don't need confidence in your own strength. You just need the courage to take another step forward.

Faith to move forward means acting on what God said before you see what He promised. It means believing that if God said "go," then He will meet you when you move. It will feel risky, but staying stuck is far more dangerous than stepping into God's next.


You're not crazy, you're stepping out!

# DAY FIFTEEN

## VISION

We've looked at the past and the present, and now, in our last week, we turn our attention to the future that holds revelation and revival. Vision is the vehicle God uses to pull us forward into the future He's prepared. It's not a self-made ambition. It's a divine direction. When God gives vision, He's not just inspiring us; He's inviting us into something He has already begun.

This is where many of us feel tension. We may see an "end goal," but Scripture says we only see in part. Some of us thrive on big-picture vision but wrestle with the in-between. Others excel in daily rhythms but feel overwhelmed by long-term outcomes. Many fall somewhere in between.

Regardless of wiring, one truth remains: we all need God's vision. And His vision is never just for us. It always includes, impacts, and requires other people. We don't need to force it or chase it. We just need to receive it. God isn't asking us to invent our future; He's asking us to align with His, for us and for those connected to us. Vision isn't us trying to catch up; it's aligning our perspective with what God has already started. Even when we feel behind, we're never late following His timing.


When vision feels unclear, Psalm 37 reminds us that vision grows where delight grows. As we find fulfillment in God, He places desires in our hearts that reflect His plans. Vision becomes a partnership. We delight in Him, and He shapes what we long for.

## Reflection:

Are you someone who naturally sees the big picture or the daily steps? How might God be inviting you to embrace your wiring and collaborate with others to see His vision fulfilled? Take time to write it out.

## Prayer:

Thank You for inviting me into Your vision for my future and the future of others. Help me delight in You so I can see what You're doing. Strengthen me in the in-between, guide my steps, and align my heart with Your direction. In Jesus' name, amen!



# DAY SIXTEEN

## GRACE

If God has called you to do it, He will give you the grace to sustain it. It's a gift. That doesn't mean we get lazy or passive. It means we work from His strength for what's ahead. Grace is God's constant power and presence, strengthening us in weakness, guiding our hearts, and shaping how we live today and tomorrow.

But there will be moments when you get tired. Not just because you're weak, but because you're human. And being tired isn't always a sign of failure. It may actually be a sign of faithfulness. You've been showing up and carrying what God asked you to carry. Feeling tired doesn't disqualify you; it often reveals obedience.

Grace comes not only to cover our sin, but also to empower our obedience, even when the journey gets tough. Isaiah 40:31 gives us a promise for our future: as we trust in the Lord again, we will find new strength. Not recycled strength. Not leftover strength. Strength that matches the season you're stepping into. Not the one you've just come through.



# DAY SEVENTEEN

## LEGACY

As we begin turning our attention toward the future, we must also turn our attention toward the legacy we will leave for the future. What God has planned isn't just about what He's doing in us, but what He wants to continue through us. Our faithfulness today becomes the foundation of the next generation's foundation tomorrow. What we model, teach, and live out will either strengthen their steps or leave them searching for a footing we could have provided.

Psalm 78 shows us God's heart: each generation should "set its hope anew on God." Legacy takes place when we pass on the baton of faith intentionally. Our shoulders are meant to become the next generation's floors. What took us years to learn should become their starting point. That's legacy.

And the best part: though God never changes, the way He moves in the next generation may look different. Expression may shift, methods may change, creativity may expand, but the message stays the same. Our role isn't to make the next generation look like us; it's to help them look like Jesus.


Our God is the God of Isaac, Abraham, and Jacob. That means He is a God of generations. He is a God who holds the current generation while making a path for the next generation. No matter your age, the question isn't if you have a legacy to invest in. The question is what will you leave behind, because each of us will leave something.

## Reflection:

What is the legacy God has placed in your life for you to invest in?

## Prayer:

God, thank You for trusting me with legacy. Help me steward it well with patience, wisdom, and love. Make my life a consistent example of Your goodness, and let my ceiling become the next generation's starting point. Empower them to walk in Your truth and hope. In Jesus' name, amen!



# DAY EIGHTEEN

## FAVOR

God's favor isn't something we earn. It's something we receive. No amount of work, striving, or performance can put us "on God's good side," because favor is not a reward for perfection. Favor flows from relationship. When we align ourselves with His plans, favor becomes a natural byproduct. Not something we convince Him to give, but something He delights to pour out.

Scripture shows us there are two kinds of favor: favor with God and favor with people. And while they're different, they often work together for our future. Proverbs teaches that loyalty and kindness position us to carry favor well. But it is God, not us, who establishes the work of our hands. We may show up, plant, and work hard, but only God can breathe on it and make it successful.

Psalm 30:5 promises that God's favor lasts a lifetime. Favor may appear in moments, but it is active over your entire life. When you look back, you can see His fingerprints. And when you look ahead, you can expect His favor to continue.

God's favor doesn't mean everything will be easy. It means God will be with you, opening the right doors, closing the wrong ones, protecting you from what you can't see, and positioning you for what He has prepared. Favor isn't about personal elevation; it's about kingdom impact.


As we prepare for what's ahead, remember: only God can establish the work of your hands. And He will.

# DAY NINETEEN

## HARVEST

The harvest is here and the harvest is coming! If you've been weary, today is the day to pick up new strength for the harvest that's coming. God has already promised that the harvest is great. Sometimes we just need to pause and examine what we're actually looking for. Another word for harvest is blessings. God is so generous with His children that He blesses us, whether we deserve it or not. However, He also established a promise with us that if we sow seeds, He will produce more blessings in our lives as our harvest. You may be praying for more workers in your season, or you may become an answer to someone else's prayer as a worker in theirs. Both matter because both connect you to what God is doing in the field.


Harvest starts long before fruit appears. It starts with sowing—sowing conversations, mentorship, encouragement, prayer, generosity, compassion, and presence. Farmers don't expect a field from one seed. They sow abundantly. And they sow before they see. The same is true in the Kingdom. God brings harvest in finances, relationships, opportunities, and calling. Those blessings matter and help us live generously. God's greatest harvest is redemption, and every blessing He gives ultimately supports that purpose. Harvest is part of God's promise, but staying in the field is our responsibility. Endurance, faithfulness, and focus keep us from quitting right before breakthrough comes. If you're tempted to give up today, hear this: your harvest is coming. Don't leave the field now. What you've planted will produce.

### Reflection:

Where do you see harvest in your life right now? Is God inviting you to help someone else bring in their harvest, or are you the one in need of support for yours?

### Prayer:

God, thank You for blessing me with a harvest. Help me recognize it even when I lose sight or feel discouraged. Prepare my heart, strengthen my hands, and guide my steps as I get ready for what You're bringing. I trust that the harvest is coming. In Jesus' name, amen!



# DAY TWENTY

## SALVATION

Salvation is the foundation of our faith and the doorway into the future God has prepared for us. We are saved by grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone. Salvation is God's gift, unearned, undeserved, and unmatched. It's not something we worked for; it's something God worked on our behalf. We've been rescued, forgiven, restored, and made new. But today, God invites us to lift our eyes toward the people around us who haven't experienced that yet.

The pressure to "save" people is not on you. We can't convince or argue anyone into God's family. Our salvation came from Him alone, and theirs will too. God simply asks us to pray, love, plant seeds, and trust Him with the rest. Scripture says if you believe in your heart and confess with your mouth, you are saved. Salvation is simple, but it's also supernatural. Only God can soften a heart, open minds, and reveal Jesus in a way that transforms someone from the inside out. And here's the good news: God wants their salvation more than you do. Remind yourself what it was like when you first experienced God's salvation. When people truly encounter the living God, He cannot be ignored. He is greater than every sickness, addiction, confusion, wound, offense, or barrier. His love is louder than their doubts, deeper than their rebellion, and stronger than their disbelief. And He is ready to make Himself known.


So today, we accept the responsibility of every believer to pray for those who are lost. God is doing the heavy lifting to bring salvation to His people.

# DAY TWENTY-ONE

## REVIVAL

Revival is when hunger for God increases.

When unity grows deeper.

When prayer becomes a priority.

When generosity moves freely.

When hearts soften, relationships heal, and salvation is abundant.

Revival isn't just a moment where God's Spirit moves. It's when we begin to move forward with Him. Acts 2 gives us a clear blueprint. Revival looks like devotion to Scripture, persistent prayer, committed community, shared resources, awe at God's power, and people saying yes to Jesus daily. Revival begins with God sparking it, and it spreads through believers who stay surrendered to His Spirit.

We cannot manufacture revival.

We cannot program it.

We cannot force it.

We cannot predict its shape or style.

Why? Because revival is not our creation. It's God's.

It doesn't look like a formula.

It looks like a Person.

Revival looks like Jesus.

And the One reviving us is His Spirit.

So yes, we expect revival in your life, your church, your family, your community, and your nation. Not because we can make it happen, but because God delights in reviving His people. We need His revival.

Reflection:

How do you sense God beginning revival in you?

Prayer:

Lord, renew me once again. Revive what has grown dry, weary, or distracted. Fill me with Your Spirit so I can carry Your life, Your unity, and Your love everywhere I go. Revive my heart, my family, my church, and my community. Do it in me and through me. In Jesus' name, amen!
